What's a Rho Gamma?

A Rho Gamma is a term used when referring to a recruitment guide. But what's a recruitment guide you ask? A recruitment guide is exactly what it sounds like- a guide for the potential new members during the recruitment process. Now, another important term to know is PNM, which as you may have guessed from reading the previous sentence, is the acronym for the term Potential New Member. But what's a potential new member you ask? A Potential New Member is a term used for all of the girls going through the recruitment process who have the potential to become a new member of the Panhellenic community.

Rho Gamma serves as an unbiased and friendly source for all PNM's by helping them get through the process both physically and emotionally. Some of the physical roles a Rho Gamma has includes guiding PNM's to and from each chapter house and taking them to selections each evening, holding nightly informational meetings and staying in dorms with the PNM's so they are always available for any questions they might have. Some of the emotional roles a Rho Gamma may take on include: listening to a PNM, answering any questions and finding out the answers to the questions they may not know, offering emotional support to any PNM and being available to help make PNMs feel more comfortable during their transition to college.

Now that you know what a Rho Gamma is, why is it such a vital role in the recruitment process? OU Junior and fellow Penhellnic woman, Leyna Churchill, said, "We are the first contact these girls have with both Panhellenic & OU, even if they went to camp crimson. This is when they realize they have really left home. And the decision to go through recruitment is one of the first decisions they make for themselves as a college student, which can be really scary and intimidating. I think a Rho G's job is to ease their fears and make their transition into college the best it can be while helping them make relationships with the girls around them!"

A Rho Gamma's main goal is to ensure a positive recruitment experience for each PNM and help these young women go through the recruitment experience to the best of their ability. Fall recruitment can be a very stressful and difficult time for incoming college students making such a big life transition. A Rho Gamma is there to help make this time easier on potential new members.
